# ***Restoration of Oak Woodlands Using Birds as Indicators***

Oak woodlands are among the richest habitats for birds and other wildlife in southern Oregon. They are also at risk due to loss of habitat and land management practices. Since many oak woodlands occur on private lands, the fate of much oak habitat lies in the hands of individual landowners. This program will discuss local research and monitoring results that provide guidance for both prioritizing oak woodland sites for protection and restoring oak woodland systems. Several resident and migratory bird species are closely associated with healthy oak woodlands. By understanding how restoration is affecting these focal species, the success of restoration efforts can be quantified.

KBO conducts long-term monitoring and applied research projects that provide scientific results about bird population trends, demographics, life history, distribution and habitat relationships
